How you'd assume the building is laid out: You enter at 1/2 of a floor, and go up to the first landing/first floor. Up the stairs is the second floor, then the third, where clay is (Just to clarify, the class NOT THE PERSON).

How it is actually built: The entrance is the first floor, then you walk up ONLY 8 STEPS to the "second" floor. That's over half of the steps up to the "third" floor!

My Hypothesis for later: The "1st" floor's height is less than the "2nd" floor's height.*

Let's get into the numbers: We interviewed: 4 people

Data:
 -4/4 said the floor problem was confusing
 -2/4 said it needs labels
 -1/4 said we should re-label the entire building
 -1/4 asked a question: Does there have to be a certain amount of stairs to say it is officially the next level? We'll come back to that later for the next set of interviews.
 -4/4 agreed we should change the layout, and make things more clear to campers, students, counselors, CITs and teachers

Questions I have so far:

What about the floor situation creates confusion?
 Is there a certain amount of stairs that says you can officially call it the next floor?
 What is the difference in height of the "first" and "second" floors? Is one of them taller than the other?

If so, how does that make one of the floors be called the first or second? Does it really matter? What is the difference between the amount of stairs between the current "second" and "third" floor and the "first" and "second" floor? Does one of them have more stairs than the other?

*The "first" floor is where you enter. The "second" floor is where the front desk is.
